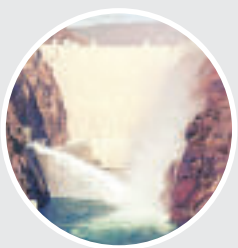
» **WAY BACK WHEN** Today in history

1935

President Franklin D. Roosevelt dedicated the giant Boulder Dam, which he hailed as "a splendid symbol." The dam started life named Boulder Dam but in 1930 President Herbert Hoover announced that it would be known as Hoover Dam. Three years later, Secretary of the Interior Harold Ickes announced that the name would be changed to Boulder Dam but it became Hoover Dam again in 1947.

1946

Nineteen Nazi leaders were found guilty of war crimes by an international military tribunal at Nuremberg. The convicted leaders included Hermann Goering, Rudolf Hess, Joachim Van Ribbontrop, Grand Admiral Karl Doenitz, Col. Gen. Alfred Jodl, Martin Bormann and Albert Speer. The court also found 500,000 members of the Gestapo guilty. Twelve were sentenced to hang.

1947

Twin mothers gave birth to twins at Hillcrest Lying-In Hospital within a period of nine hours — all four babies delivered by the same doctor. The first set of twins, Grady Lee and Elaine Bee Nichols, arrived shortly after 3 a.m. Phyllis Carol and Phillip Calvin Karr arrived shortly after noon. The mothers, Waneta Jordan Nichols and Valeta Jordan Karr, were born Feb. 14, 1922, in Collinsville.

Brady Heights honored

Magazine includes neighborhood on list

City folks looking to buy an older home need look no further than Tulsa, according to the editors of This Old House magazine, which included the historic Brady Heights neighborhood in its online list of "Best Places for City Slickers to Buy an Old House."

The neighborhood, just north of downtown, was one of 14 in the country chosen for its "City Slickers" list on criteria, such as diversity, historic integrity and preservation, neighborhood amenities and more, said Deborah Snoonian, senior editor.

The list was first published in a summer issue of the magazine, but further details are online at tulsaworld.com/thisoldhouse.

Editors said on the site: "Now on the National Register of Historic Places and just blocks from downtown Tulsa, Brady Heights ... encompasses an eclectic choice of housing, populated by a diverse mix of owners and renters. Four churches and an active community group that helps older residents take care of their homes provide the social glue."

"We're seeing that cities are realizing that preserving old housing stock is a way to help areas maintain value because it has historical integrity," Snoonian said.

spoke with real estate agents, state and local historical societies and homeowners, and "after a couple of phone calls, it became obvious that any time you were talking about Oklahoma, (Brady Heights) was the place that was mentioned."

The Web site also listed Brady Heights on other lists: Best Places to Buy a Craftsman House, Best Places to Get a Bargain on an Old House, and Best Places for First-Time Buyers to Get an Old House.
